Of all his major accomplishments, he was most proud of his family. He loved spending time with his wife, daughter, son-in-law and granddaughter. He especially cherished Sunday dinner with his family, and thoroughly enjoyed cooking for others in his retirement. He had a personality that was larger than life, and may be best known for his quick wit and impeccable sense of humor.
